1.1 1.1.1	Approval of previous minutes OSC presented the minutes and sought comments from members. The minutes were endorsed by the BHCVWG members and OSC informed members that it will be uploaded on the RSPO website.	
1.1.2	OT and AH requested the RSPO to clarify the involvement Board of Governors (BoG) in the compensation panel by cross checking this with the BoG meeting notes.

2.0 2.0.1	2.0 Update on Budget OSC presented the spending for BHCVWG for financial year July 2014 to June 2015.	
3.0 3.0.1	3.0 Update on Compensation Panel DS presented to the WG the new composition of the compensation panel, as well as the assignment of compensation cases.	
3.0.2	HK raised on objection on Hutan's involvement in Genting's compensation cases. Hutan has declared a conflict of interest with Genting Plantations and should not be involved in any cases related to Genting Plantations.	
3.0.3	SP commented that, the current assignment for compensation cases may not be fair as the number of cases per company varies. OT and AH suggested to list all the compensation cases per company. It was also important to note the progress of compensation cases in the new updated sheet.

5.0 5.0.1	5.0 Update on workshop to incentivize grower members The plan to organise the workshop materialised from previous meeting when the co-chair of ERWG (Emission Reduction Working Group) presented their work to the BHCVWG. Members from both WGs were interested to co-organise the workshop together with members of ERWG.	
5.0.2	OSC informed the WG that members who volunteered to organise the workshop have proposed to have it in October. GLT explained to members that Criteria 7.8 requires company to set	
	aside HCS areas in new development and the default value for carbon sequestration is still a work in progress within the ERWG. The ERWG felt that the set aside HCS and HCV areas within the plantation could be used as carbon/emission credit for growers and a workshop could be organised to explore ideas.	
5.0.3	SiS commented that in order to incentives growers to set aside HCS and HCV areas for carbon sequestration, individuals with marketing background could be brought into this sub-group. He also proposed that Joshua Lim could be the right person to help the sub-group. OSC replied that once the concept note is ready, it will be circulated to members.

6.0	6.0 Update on compensation staged implementation period & compensation plan evaluator cost OSC provided update on the cost of hiring compensation plan evaluator to the WG. The RSPO counter proposed that the evaluation cost for first submission would be covered by the RSPO uptil May 9 th , 2016. From May 10 th 2016 to May 9 th 2017, the RSPO will cover half the cost. Subsequent submissions for the same concession due to poor quality of the compensation plan will need to be at the company's expense. After May 9 th 2017, companies will cover the cost. The TF accepted the proposal and expressed their gratitude over the proposed cost arrangement.

8.0 8.0.1	 8.0 HCV Assessor Licensing Scheme (ALS), Unified HCV Approach for smallholders update and HCV toolkit for oil palm sector. AL provided updates on the HCV ALS. In August, there were more than 60 provisional licensed assessors and 7 registered training organisations. There were 21 HCV assessment report reviewers registered with HCV Resource Network. Sticky issues related to HCV ALS were presented. AL sought feedback from members whether assessors involved in complaints should be allowed to join the HCV ALS. 	
8.0.2	AL also presented the progress of Unified HCV approach for Smallholders to members. Findings from field testing in Ghana, Tanzania, Indonesia and Honduras were also shared with the WG.	
8.0.3	AL proceeded with the brainstorming session for the proposed HCV toolkit for palm oil sector. The WG agreed that the current common guidance for identification of HCV was sufficient and a specific HCV toolkit for palm oil sector was unnecessary. The WG proposed that budget allocated for this project be used for the 3 rd BHCVWG project. See Annex 2 for presentation.

	GN explained that in Indonesia, HCV assessment findings and area planned for development submitted via NPP may be different from the final lease (HGU). She then asked whether companies are allowed to update the HCV assessment findings. GN commented that a procedure for review and update of HCV assessment should be provided. MZ suggested members who have experience in Indonesia to present these cases to the WG. GN and SP volunteered to work on examples of cases.	
8.1	Action point: GN and SP to prepare examples related to HCVs area during and after NPP submission.	
9.0 9.0.1	9.0 NPP update and public consultation OSC provided updates on the NPP revision exercise to members and highlighted major proposals and changes in the NPP relevant to HCVs. She also informed members that the document was already available on the RSPO website for public consultation. She reminded members to provide comments via online and during the public consultation workshop.

Current activities

- HCVRN now an independent legal entity under UK law
- Ensure clear ALS requirements in updated version of NPP
- Building an expert register of team members
- Webinars: Latest in Bahasa Indonesia
- HCV Assessor Training Courses underway in Africa, Asia and Latin America



- Engagement with other cert. schemes through ISEAL to promote consistent HCV understanding & implementation
- Keeping track of feedback from users & stakeholders
- Maintenance & improvement of web platform
- Preparing participation in palm conference in Colombia



Sticky issues

- Currently, ALS only required by RSPO NPP assessments outside this scope could be performed poorly
- Provisional assessors involved in complaints dilemma of suspending licences for work done before ALS was in place
- Analysing if we should accept ALS training course examination as part of application
- NPPs slowing down? Or growers not using licensed assessors? We haven't received that many reports... Can RSPO give us numbers?

Overview of (draft) unified approach

- 1. Initial landscape risk assessment is the unified approach applicable?
- 2. Preparations collect info on smallholder capacity/organisation, identify potentially present focal species and relevant ecosystem services
- 3. Smallholder meetings inform about certification. Discuss suggested focal species and other HCVs, threats, and agree on a set of Precautionary Practises.
- 4. Verification and monitoring combination of self-assessment checklists, control by Group Manager and auditing by CB
- 5. Procedures for new plantings mandatory site inspection by Group Manager. Expansion allowed on degraded lands without further assessment



Field testing sites

- <u>Ghana:</u> Adum Banso palm plantation farmers organisation in W Ghana 52 SH and 100ha – with Solidaridad and Rainforest Alliance
- <u>Tanzania</u>: Kigoma smallholder farmer project 76 SH and 30 ha with Seed Change
- Indonesia: Air Putih farmer association in Riau 100-200 farmers and 450 ha with SNV
- Honduras: Jaremar smallholder project 70 SH and 1,500 ha with Proforest



Scope of field testing

- (Initial landscape risk assessment work in progress with WRI and Daemeter, desktop analysis of field sites by Proforest, not field tested)
- 2. Preparations, including guidance materials
- 3. Smallholder meetings, including guidance materials
- 4. (Verification and monitoring will be field tested in Q 4, 2015)
- 5. (Procedures for new plantings need more work on methodology before testing)





Main feedback/findings so far

- Initial risk filter complicated and overcautious need some rethink of both criteria and where it best fits into the methodology
- Smallholder meetings to discuss and agree precautionary practises to maintain focal species and ecosystem services works well, guidance helpful
- Good preparations for meetings important
- Training Group Managers so that they understand and can implement the approach essential
- We should start thinking on how to help smallholders maintain HCVs also in more risky situations

- SHARP-HCVRN-WRI-Daemeter meeting on risk mapping end of August
- Further work on application / safeguards for new plantings

HCV M&M Guide in oil palm landscapes

- On the RSPO to-do list for a long time
- Partly reflecting 'forestry bias' of early interpretations
- Identification same for all sectors but M&M to maintain HCVs may vary from sector to sector
- Globally applicable OP guidance challenge to address country specific challenges and yet be generic
- Key issues brainstormed in May meeting
- No general agreement on priorities



Brainstorm – issues linked to planning

- Functional wildlife corridors
- Patch value / viability / dynamics (HCS)
- 'Layman-synthesis' of recent advances in conservation biology
- Ensure compatibility with HCS (Zero Deforestation commitments)
- Landscape level planning beyond concessions
- Opportunities for neighbouring RSPO members to collaborate
- Community Land Use Planning tool (cf HCS Toolkit)
- Ensure compensatory smallholdings provide viable livelihoods



Brainstorm - management

- Impacts of palm on hydrology and livelihoods
- Pesticide impacts on HCVs
- Dealing with encroachment from outside
- Maitenance of HCVs in areas of influence outside concessions
- Collaboration with State agencies in neighbouring protected areas/ protection forests
- Co-management with local communities
- Co-Management with government
- Compensation payments: ensure cash is not blown too soon and pressure reverts to land



Brainstorm - monitoring

- Link HCV monitoring to ESIA reporting
- Engaging communities in monitoring (learn from REDD+)
- User-friendly tools / approaches for smallholders
- Training of smallholders / lead farmers



Other suggestions

- Excision of HCV areas allocated to other concessionaires
- On-line forum for sharing HCV lessons learned
- Compilation of informative and inspirational HCV oil palm case studies
- HCV checklist / HCV guide for CB auditors
- HCV training for CBs and ASI



Next steps...

- Prioritise and focus on most important needs
- Check overlaps with already identified BHCV WG prioritises
- Formalise proposal
