	SR Uptake Target performance 2024 based on ACOP 2023  • Globally, 1188 members had to comply with the SR CSPO uptake target by ACOP2023.	
	<ul> <li>Since the target compliance is monitored, there have been an increase in the number of members meeting the uptake target year by year.</li> <li>Globally, 674 members (57% of the total members, i.e 1188) met the CSPO uptake target for 2023. A small increase of 2% compared with last year (i.e. 662)</li> <li>Leading regions in terms of number of members meeting the target are EU- 413 members, NA - 115, RoW- 79 (Japan 43 members)</li> <li>Referring to the sectors, the number of P&amp;T, CGM and Retailers who met the target has increased by 1%, 1% and 9% respectively.</li> </ul>	
	In the 35th SRWG meeting on 1st October 2024 it was presented the <i>Actual CSPO uptake growth vs SR uptake target</i> by the P&T, CGM and Retailer.  After some internal investigation it was concluded that those numbers are based on ALL the P&T, CGM and Retailers ACOP profiles answered during ACOP period, which is different from the SR SCOPE (i.e. Only Ordinary non grower members, uptake target applies to the primary business activity, and exemptions apply).	

	Therefore, the total number of P&T, CGM and Retailers considered in this assessment is different from those obliged to comply with the SR Uptake target and both indicators should not be compared.  SR Unit to work with IMEL Unit to get the 'Actual CSPO uptake growth vs SR uptake target" data only counting on the P&T, CGM and Retailers that shall comply with SR uptake target. The correct data to be presented to the SRWG and MDSC in the due time.	
5.0	Terms of Reference for the Review of SR  Draft Terms of Reference for the SR review - here  Shared with SRWG by email and NO objection received (deadline 13 February). Currently under MDSC review, deadline 6th March. SRWG is the governance body in charge of performing the SR review → feedback, support and willingness to reach consensus is expected by SRWG members. The main objective is to keep the SR framework relevant for RSPO members. March call - kick start and initial alignment on some points April call (tidd when) - alignment on new/open points May physical meeting in Paris- finalise alignment on some key points, and bring them to the MDSC (joint meeting) Q3 and Q4 calls/meetings TBD based on May outputs. requirements to make them more relevant and impactful, identifying:

- a. which requirements are **relevant** for <u>each</u> sector and which ones are most impactful to prioritise monitoring and implementation.
- b. which requirements are **not relevant** for <u>specific</u> sectors and could be temporarily or permanently removed from the SR framework.
- c. Given the insights gained from the analysis above, reconsider the **scope** of the SR implementation.

## This review will be done together by SRWG and SR Unit

The draft contains different topics to reconsider the **scope** of the SR implementation. Initial discussion and alignment on:

- 1. Members to **whom** the SR requirements apply Currently, SR applies to Ordinary members, with some exemptions and based on <u>registered</u> sector.
  - Q: Should the scope of the SR implementation be expanded to include growers with P&T or CGM activities?

If so, what are the specific benefits of expanding the scope? Would expanding the scope help drive CSPO and CSPKO uptake?

Discussion: The group discusses expanding the scope of Shared Responsibility (SR) to include growers with processing and trading (P&T) activities. They consider the benefits and challenges of this expansion, including potential pushback from growers who are already subject to the P&C certification requirements. The discussion focuses on how to identify and classify these integrated companies, whether to base the classification on revenue or volume, and how to ensure transparent reporting of uptake in ACOP. It concluded the need to gather more data on the number of growers with P&T activities and their volumes before making a decision to expand the scope.

SR Unit to identify the number of growers with P&T activities, and the number of P&T with CGM activity and the volumes traded as CGM.

 CSPO/CSPKO uptake reporting - the uptake targets applicable are determined by registered sector (despite members being operating in different sectors) - E.g. P&T with CGM, Growers with P&T. **Q**: Shall the member comply with the uptake target corresponding to its registered sector, or should the member comply with ALL the uptake targets applicable to its operations, despite its registered sector?

*Discussion*: Some members of the Board do feel that there are significant volumes traded by P&T who have CGM activities and that they are not reported in ACOP as members normally only report in their registered sector.

As in the previous discussion, it is concluded to gather the available data on the number of P&T with CGM activities and their volumes before making a decision on the uptake target applicable to integrated companies.

3. The use of **RSPO credits** for increasing uptake - Currently, CGMs and Retailers can buy credits to cover their uptake.

Q: Do we agree with allowing P&T buying (ISH) Credits? If so, will send the recommendation to the SCCS Review TF

Discussion: The group discusses the possibility of allowing processors and traders (P&Ts) to purchase independent smallholder credits. There is general support for this idea, especially for smallholder support activities. It was discussed that restricting P&Ts from buying credits seems odd and suggests reviewing this policy through the Supply Chain Certification Standard task force. The group agrees that allowing P&Ts to buy smallholder credits for support activities could be beneficial. SRWG decided to propose this change while keeping the broader question of P&Ts buying credits for uptake targets open for further discussion, pending more clarity on the original reasons for the restriction. The group emphasizes the need to align any changes with the Supply Chain Certification Standard to avoid conflicting rules in different documents.
