3.1	<ul> <li>Indonesia NI (for approval)</li> <li>JM presented to the Committee the response received from the Indonesia NITF.</li> <li>INA NIWG have agreed with suggestion/revision from SSC on the definition of "Non-corporate land clearance". The suggested definition will be added to the specific guidance for indicator 7.7.7.</li> <li>INA NIWG accepted SSC decision and suggestion that English language to be used as a reference in case of any discrepancy.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The Committee is in view that the response by the Indonesia NI regarding the point on "acceptable legal alternatives" need to be resolved.</li> <li>As a background, on 12 March 2020, the RSPO Secretariat convey the decision made at BoG meeting to the Indonesia NITF, through the RRO JKT, regarding the HGU as follow:</li> <li>For all new certification, company(ies) must have HGU or other acceptable legal alternatives; and</li> <li>For all re-certification, company(ies) can continue certification provided that they must show sufficient evidence that the</li> </ul>	



company(ies) is moving towards obtaining the HGU and must comply with all requirements at the time. The Indonesia NI TF were tasked to clarify the interpretation of 'acceptable legal alternatives". On 24th March, the Indonesia NI replied: • Currently, there are no laws and regulations in Indonesia which can be used as a reference to interpret "acceptable legal alternatives". Therefore, on the form of land legality, INA NI has already provided some guidance in the Specific Guidance for 4.4.2, particularly the fourth bullet point that says: "The form of land legality is adequately consulted through the FPIC process with the community and in accordance with applicable laws and Regulations" The scope of INA NI is to interpret Generic P&C INA NI as per Indonesia's context included law and regulations. INA NI has been developed through the deliberation of all requirements based on the Generic P&C 2018. The term "acceptable legal alternatives" is not found in the Generic P&C 2018. Therefore, INA NIWG is in the view that interprets "acceptable legal alternatives" are not within the scope of INA NIWG. After a lengthy discussion, the Committee is agreeable in principle to approve the Indonesia NI but with caveat of an explanation for this matter (on HGU/ acceptable legal alternatives). It was also raised that SNGO might have concern to approve the NI if this matter is not being dealt now. • The NITF is the most appropriate entity to be assigned to do the legal review/ research on the "acceptable legal alternative". The NITF may decide whether the NITF will do it by themselves or they wish to hire a group/ a consultant to do this for them, as long as the process is endorsed by the NI TF. • The proposed a timeline to come up with the interpretation om "acceptable legal alternatives" and to submit to SSC by Sept 2020. **Decision:** The Committee proposed to have another follow up meeting on 9th April 2020 to discuss the matter and to invite the RRO Indonesia Director, Ms Tiur Rumondang, to provide some background on this matter (on "acceptable legal alternative") before the SSC can make the final decision. 3.2 MY NI (for approval) JM presented the background of the request made by MYNI. JW commented the criteria for Low. Medium and High risks are • the same for the Social Sensitive Area. For the Environmental Sensitive Area, there were no low and medium risks criteria. • The low should be "community have enough available sources to fulfil their basic need"; the medium "food security"; for high risk "community is heavily dependent to the forest resources". Decision:

4.0	<ul> <li>Updates NDJSG, HFCC and Gabon NI</li> <li>AA presented the background of this session in reference to the decision made by SSC at the previous meeting i.e. SSC to write a letter to NDJSG to request for a workplan with clear timeline by when the procedure can be developed. Also a suggestion for the NDJSG to review the methodology proposed by the Gabon NIWG.</li> <li>Secretariat has discussed the matter including analysing its pros/cons.</li> <li>Based on the analysis, the Secretariat is proposing to SSC that the letter to NDJSG to be approached by way that SSC supports the work done by NDJSG and does understand the delay of the process due to the complexities of the subject, however, to highlight it to the group the urgency to develop the procedure.</li> <li>To assist the NDJSG, Secretariat proposed to appoint 2 persons from the SSC to be the focal person for the NDJSG to reaise their concern during the development of the procedure.</li> <li>The main issue with the NDJSG is that there is no workplan. It is not possible to work when there is no plan as target. The NDJSG need to come up with a workplan. SSC may need to evaluate and decide if the NDJSG approach working or not.</li> <li>On update of the NI Gabon, the meeting scheduled in March 2020 was postponed due to Covid-19 and push to July 2020. The meeting will discuss all the comments received during public consultation.</li> <li>Submit the draft to RSPO by end July 2020.</li> </ul>	Action Point: AA to prepare a draft for SSC by next week.

5.1	<ul> <li>Updates on Shared Responsibility</li> <li>OSC presented the updates on activities thus far, and the status of filling up the seats in SRWG. The call for expression of interest were closed on 3rd April 2020. Received more interest from Growers, P&amp;T and SNGO.</li> <li>Issue raised with regards to who will represent the constituency when there are too many nomination coming from the same organisation but of different company. The usual way is for the constituency to make their own decision among themselves who to represent the category. Also to highlight the rules that no 2 seats allowed to be taken by individuals that are coming from the same organisation or from 2 different companies but related to each other.</li> <li>For SH representative, it was proposed to contact SHSC to nominate its member as representative and to act as link to SHSC, regardless the representative is a smallholder or not. SHSC is scheduled to meet at end of April 2020.</li> </ul>

5.3	<ul> <li>RISS Local Interpretation- Indonesia</li> <li>JM presented the update on the RISS Local Interpretation.</li> <li>The announcement on this has been published via RSPO website. It has also been conveyed to the Indonesia SH TF that was working on the development of LI RISS for Indonesia.</li> <li>The first meeting took place in February and the subsequent meeting was pushed to June 2020 in view of the Covid-19 issue. Taskforce been formed and a facilitator has been appointed. The TF plan to submit the LI by September 2020 with 1 public consultation, subject to advise/approval by SSC.</li> </ul>	
5.2	<ul> <li>Updates on metrication</li> <li>OSC shared updates on metrication by showing the chronology of events.</li> <li>The development of the metrication templates is almost complete. Only left 3 indicators to focus on i.e. monthly mills, estates and training data.</li> <li>MPOA, OLAM and Bumitama remain as volunteers from SSC helping in finalizing this work. Any interested member who wish to join the team are most welcomed. JW volunteered to join the group on this. OSC will contact all volunteers to continue the work on this.</li> <li>What next: <ul> <li>To finalize the outstanding metrics</li> <li>Call for other members to work on the metrics template</li> <li>To finalize it by the end of May 2020 and present to SSC.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
	• Appointment of consultant will take place in April 2020. Similar timeline in formalizing/approving of the formation of SRWG by SSC. It is expected the SRWG will active by May 2020 and Q1 FY21.	



	<ul> <li>There may be impacts to the work of SSC such as the Decent Living Wage which anticipated would require involvement with stakeholders and on the ground works.</li> <li>The SSC may also need to re-evaluate its physical meeting scheduled in July 2020 and see if it is feasible.</li> <li>SSC will need to review or allow some flexibility in its processes if meeting cannot take place due to the Covid-19. SSC need to properly record should there any exception to be given to any group due to the issue. There will be challenges to implement the standard in such time, hence, SSC will try to convene and approve via online where necessary. This is important to support continuity and good functioning of RSPO.</li> <li>A dedicated page on Covid-19 was created in the RSPO webpage.</li> <li>Situation on the ground:</li> <li>Most extension services has been stopped temporarily. Meeting are done through phone.</li> <li>Other commodity in Africa has moved fully to digital sourcing and payment.</li> <li>With the government guidelines applied at the moment, company has put limits to the number of people that can be transported from one place to another. Company has introduced staggered work rotation to comply with the government guideline.</li> <li>For audit purpose, company have to readjust the team to come from the region and not from other continent.</li> <li>Internal audit has been rescheduled and postponed. On the ground level, all measures set by the government are followed by providing them with mask, temperature check, social distancing etc.</li> <li>Concern goes to smallholders whose source of income may have been seriously affected due to this pandemic.</li> <li>As reported by Economy Analyst, the Covid-19 pushing the countries in the Pacific potentially to a fail states status. Poor coordination led to fear at the sub-regional level with blocked shipping coming in and blocked movement of people, incoming food. In relation to certification system, no auditors will be able to come in the next at least 6 to 9 months</li></ul>	Action Point: Secretariat to inform SSC if there any WG/TF that would require such exception.
6.2	<ul> <li>Announcement</li> <li>JW announced that she will be moving to another organisation (standard biomass program) and leaving WWF-Germany by end of May 2020. She has offered to WWF and with mandate of WWF, to continue her current role in few committees (WG/TF). There will be no conflict of interest in continuing this role. Still in discussion with WWF and no decision made yet.</li> </ul>
